Opeyemi Adeliyi **Essex County College Breakthrough to Nursing** Director



Transitioning from Nursing **Education to Nursing** Leadership: A Student's Perspective Oge Ileogbunam, NJNS Treasurer

As nursing students, we devote numerous hours to textbooks, clinical rotations, and simulations to get ready for our future careers as medical professionals. Making the leap, however, from nursing education to nursing leadership calls for more than just clinical knowledge: it also calls for a combination of vision, flexibility, and mentoring. Reflecting on my recent experience at the 72nd Annual Nursing Convention hosted by the New Jersey Nursing Students, Inc. (NJNS) in Atlantic City, NJ, I have learned a lot about this shift.

Embracing the Generational Gap

The convention theme of "Nursing: Bridging the Generational Gap" resonated deeply with many attendees including me. In a time when there are nurses from different generations working together, transformational leadership requires recognizing and utilizing the skills of each age group. Speaking with both experienced nurses and recent grads offered a diverse range of viewpoints on team dynamics, technology integration, and patient care. Many were previous board members of NJNS. Given that they were about the same age as me, we were able to establish a connection concerning a multitude of issues ranging from student outreach and increasing community involvement to nursing school grading criteria and NCLEX pass rates.

Of course, it is easy enough to bond with individuals of similar age groups, but the challenge arises when working in tandem with those inspires and motivates others and of a different time. Politics, socioeconomics and pop culture all play a major role in widening the divide across generations. It is up to those aware of this split to begin pushing forward the need to bridge the gap. Acknowledging and embracing the strengths and contributions of each generation to the nursing profession is a step in the right direction.

Leadership Development **Opportunities**

My time as a monitor, a role that may be viewed by some as minor, was still held in high regard by those who received me. I was able to land this position due to the abundance of leadership opportunities provided to us as students. This served as a key component for our transition from

educational stewardship to leadership roles alike. Additionally, attending nursing professional workshops and engaging in informative breakout sessions helped many students pave the road for leadership positions in healthcare organizations by networking with people in influential positions. These lectures focused on the value of learning how to manage the intricacies of contemporary healthcare environments, especially as a new nurse in a rapidly changing profession.

Reflecting on Personal Growth

My journey from a nursing student to an emerging leader was brought forth by the knowledge I received during my time at the convention. There are several steps involved in moving from student nurse to becoming more involved in the nursing community, particularly in taking on leadership roles. It is about becoming someone who not merely gaining a title or position. Here are some helpful points I picked up along the way.

The Power of Mentorship and Networking

Throughout the convention, mentoring came up frequently. Developing a mentor-mentee relationship can have a big impact on our career advancement. We were able to create relationships with hundreds of nursing professionals and students that would help us in our future jobs. Additionally, the presence of more than thirty exhibitors offered a forum for investigating a range of employment options and learning about the most recent advancements in healthcare. As we move up the leadership ladder, the convention emphasizes the

importance of mentorship and urges us to seek advice from seasoned nurses and nurse educators from various schools.

Skilled nurses may offer direction, impart their knowledge, and assist us in navigating the challenges of our professions. Attending conferences like the NJNS convention and networking with colleagues and seasoned professionals helps us create a network of support that can help with career advancement, advice, and collaborative opportunities.

Cultivating Leadership Skills Early

Witnessing other students assume leadership positions in their communities and schools was one of the convention's most motivating it. With these tools, we have all that features. Being a leader does not just come with years of experience, leaders of the future. but it starts right now.

Opportunities to improve our leadership abilities as novice nurses include volunteering for leadership positions, joining student nursing organizations, and taking an active role in professional development. These experiences show dedication to the field, teach valuable lessons about duty and responsibility, and lay the groundwork for future positions.

Preparing for Real World Challenges

The convention emphasized how critical it is to be ready for obstacles that arise in the real world. For example, the purpose of the NCLEX review session was not only to ensure that we pass the exam but also to make sure we have the critical thinking and decision-making abilities required for practical application. We must be ready to handle a variety of problems as future leaders, from

administrative duties to patient care.

Ultimately, making the shift from nursing education to nurse leadership is a continuous process that calls for commitment, education, and initiative. My conceptualization of what it takes to be a nursing leader has been greatly influenced by the realizations I had from the NJNS Annual Convention. I urge readers to continue propagating the lessons shared here to student nurses across the country. The age old saying, "knowledge is power," rings true to this present day.
